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Rambling thoughts from the President

The 2014 Forum is coming soon...and it will be an exciting time. Eight concerts primarily devoted to SCL members' music. Guest artists from Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, and North Carolina, as well as local professionals, faculty members, and students performing on the stage of Roland Hayes Concert Hall at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. Voices, strings, woodwinds, piano, percussion, digital sound, narration and video add up to make this a feast of musical variety.

The Forum begins and ends with large ensemble performances. On Thursday, Feb. 20, the Southern Adventist University Orchestra will give a concert at UTC, including an SCL members' work. SAU is located in Collegedale, Tennessee, about 30 minutes or so from UTC. And on Saturday, Feb. 22, the UTC Chamber Singers and UTC String Orchestra will offer up five SCL works on the closing concert.

There are two recitals, one showcasing guest pianist Walton Lott (a doctoral student at UNCG), and another featuring UTC faculty clarinetist Nikolasa Tejero (with friends). Additionally, there are three other concerts of mixed chamber music.

Student composers have some special opportunities in this Forum also: the first and second place winners of the Arnold Salop Memorial competition for 2013 will be performed; and the Marian Anderson String Quartet will conduct a reading session of movements of student works. And, two student members will have music performed.

The centerpiece of the Forum, Friday evening, is a concert featuring the Marian Anderson String Quartet. These four women of color make up the first African American ensemble to win a major international competition in classical music, the Cleveland Quartet prize (1991). They went on to perform at the 1993 Presidential inaugural in Washington DC, and later won the Guarneri Award from Chamber Music America. It has been a dream of mine to bring highly accomplished "minority" musicians to Chattanooga, and the Forum seemed like a good time to start.

Do all Forums need to be like this? Not at all. A more low-key event on a smaller scale can be just as rewarding. Guest artists are almost always a part of SCL Forums, anyway,

along with SCL members who perform, and with gratitude from all of us, musicians from the host institutions. When one thinks of the devotion and effort required to present a weekend of music by living composers, who in turn spend their own money and time to attend the performances, it is perhaps reassuring that this many people care about new music.

And, of course, SCL Forums are hardly alone in this—there are events for members of Society of Composers, Inc.; National Association of Composers int he USA (NACUSA); College Music Society regional and national conferences routinely feature "composers' concerts;" SEAMUS, for electro-acoustic music; and various new music festivals at campuses and in cities and communities across the country and indeed around the world. There are lots of active composers! And many gifted, well-trained musicians, some of whom are at least willing (and some gung-ho) to perform new music, at least occasionally.

In the face of financial challenges to higher education, K-12 arts education, regional and major orchestras and opera companies, there are still moments to celebrate and be reminded that what we do matters.

Ken Davies' *Quietudes #2 & #4* for organ were performed at Houghton College, Houghton, NY during the Christian Fellowship of Art Music Composers Conference October 25-26, 2013. On October 29, 2013, Ken's *Collage 2013* received a recital performance at USM, Hattiesburg, MS. Also on October 29, 2013, British bass trombone soloist, Jonathan Warburton, performed Ken's *Alpine Pastorale* for solo bass trombone, a work composed especially for Mr. Warburton. On November 1, 2013 *Collage 2013* was premiered at the Mississippi Music Teacher's Association Conference at the MS University for Women in Columbus. Dr. Jason Bergman (tpt), Dr. Ben McIlwain (tbn), and Dr. Ellen Elder (pno) of The Me-We Trio performed.

Ken's *Escape from the Matrix* (1st movement) for euphonium and piano received its premier performance on January 15, 2014 at Louisiana Tech University, Ruston, LA by euphoniumist Cody Ford. In addition, Ken's *Strings Ablaze* for string orchestra (University of Tennessee at Chattanooga Orchestra) and *Sapphire Kaleidoscope* for piano (Walton Lott, pianist) will be heard at the 2014 SCL Forum in Chattanooga at the University of Tennessee.

Dr. Ben Mcilwain (tbn) and Dr. Ellen Elder (pno) will take Ken's *Crossroads* for two trombones and piano on their recital tour to five universities where the faculty trombonists will join them. The work was commissioned by Dr. Mcilwain in 2012. Scheduled are: February 27th, with Dr. Josh Hauser at Tennessee Tech University, February 28th, with Dr. Daniel Cloutier at the University of Tennessee-Knoxville, March 1st, with Brad Kerns at the University of Kentucky, March 2nd, with Dr. Drew Leslie at Appalachian State University, and March 3rd, with Dr. Brad Edwards at the University of South Carolina.

Lauren McCall was commissioned to write an arrangement of the spiritual *I'm troubled* for the Grady Rayam Prize in Sacred Music. It will be used for a choral competition in February, and it will be premiered in March by Karen Slack Blackwell and myself.
